The Covid-19 pandemic had a huge impact on the implementation of our programmes. However, in line with the Scout ethos, our members recognised that the challenges created were also opportunities for growth. .

In March 2020 all face-to-face Scouting was stopped with immediate effect and a member-driven Scouting from Home online resource page was started on <u>SSA's Wiki</u>. Programmes were developed that could be done at home. The WhatsApp lines and emails started to buzz as volunteers started to send out activities for members to do at home. Within a few weeks, some Groups were running Zoom and Discord meetings at the normal Scout meeting times. This brought some structure and social interaction to our youth and their families. Inter-Patrol competitions and fun days were run virtually, Rovers started online sessions where they learnt new skills from each other, and Cubs and Meerkats ran a recognition campaign where the kids made "thank you cards" which were then sent electronically to Essential Service providers in their neighbourhoods. When schools re-opened, a <u>Covid-19 Awareness resource</u> from the Namibian Scouts was adapted and launched as a SSA challenge badge. The Covid-19 Cub requirements were later repackaged by the UK-based online educational resource provider ASDAN. The resource was circulated worldwide and gave recognition to SSA and the Namibian Scouts. A <u>member info page</u> on the <u>national SSA website</u> continues to provide updated regulations and quidelines.

For some of you planning a Springbok hike brings back fond memories. For Maria Southey from 58th Durban Air Scouts, it will always attest to her preseverance and positive attitude! Here she recounts her experience. "We had to conquer multiple obstacles like Covid, the Level 3 lockdown, and the weight picked up from Christmas lunch and New Years" she quips. "After weeks of planning, changing routes, changing the duration of my Springbok hike, the tons of stress that came with it and postponing my hike multiple times because of Covid, trials and finals, we finally got to go on the hike from 16 – 18 January 2021!

We started hiking from Giants Castle to Bannermans Hut on the first day (12.5km). We then continued to Centenary Hut the second day (14km) and completed our journey at Injushuti Base Camp (12km) on the third day. Due to the Covid safety regulations the hike was a little tougher than anticipated. We each had to sleep in our own seperate tents so we could not share the tent weight among ourselves. We also couldn't hike close to each other which took some time, and we were not able to share things. Yet, we had a blast on this hike!

My team members were the absolute best to hike with! To think to hike 38,5km in three days was hectic. As a team we overcame obstacles and grew an unforgettable bond. While passing my Springbok hike, I could also tick off another challenge which was The Senior Scout Hike Challenge!

scouting-in-schools (sis)

For 4 years SSA has been offering Scouting in low and no fee paying schools through a partnership with the after school Game Changer initiative and the Western Cape Government. In 2020 29 schools and more

than 1,200 children benefitted from the Scout programme. In 2021 this will be increased to 80 schools.

The initiative includes the training of unemployed youth from the serviced school's community as intern leaders to run the Scout Group activities. They receive various forms of training such as formal courses, integration with host Groups, individual skills training, and being part of Regional events.

Learning to manage life-work realities and developing various communication and time management skills prepares these youths for the employment markets. Many have gone on to find employment or have started to study after the SSA training.

I can see how being able to use a computer changes them a it feels good to help a person gain confidence and ablities."

"I am happiest when I am able to help children learn", says Jabu with a smile. "During the intake interview I was asked if I am able to work with others. It made me think about how I operate and I noticed that I used to do things on my own. Through SiS I have learnt to work with others and to share ideas. Now I'm able to solve many things with the help of others. I have also learnt how to communicate better and feel that I can now help children with these skills too. I use games and play to teach children skills. They have fun and learn by doing how to solve problems and gain confidence in themselves. By being prepared they can tackle any challenge coming their way from exams to situations in life.

23 year old Jabu Hlangane doesn't let "Even though I am differently abled, that has not stopped me from achieving my goals. We were all created equal by God and just need to push ourselves to get through tough situations. With a positive "I can do it!" attitude and willingness to do your best, you can do anything you want in life!
