"ride the wind and fly like an eagle"

Eagles have powerful eyes. Their vision is estimated to be four to eight times stronger than a human's. Incredibly, they're said to be able to see a rabbit from over three kilometres away! Their elite eyesight helps them to focus on their prey even while flying at high speeds. A hunter's greatest power over its prey is seeing it first. Because eagles see their prey first, they gain an immediate tactical advantage.

What if you saw your life circumstances and goals as your prey? What if you anticipated the things that would happen as a result of your actions? That gives you the advantage of adjusting your approach. Things do happen to us without us knowing sometimes, but more often than not, the direction we take determines what we'll receive.

Eagles' diets are mostly fish, but they can eat a large variety of creatures as needed. Aside from eating numerous species of fish and birds, eagles will also eat rabbits, hares, ground squirrels and a few other small animals. When they can't find fish, they'll find something else.

Life requires flexibility in the same way. To thrive you mustn't only look for the same opportunities, you need to see new types of opportunities that you may not have considered before. The key to survival throughout history has always been adaptability. Those who adapt to their environment survive.

Flying is core to an eagle's identity—they're born to fly! Eagles begin flying at 10-12 weeks old. To learn, they practice short flights to nearby trees and observe their parents fly. An eagle that doesn't fly is a sad eagle.



- * **North/East/South/West**
 Indicate where North is, and then the four boundaries of your playing area are North, South, East and West. The Leader calls out a compass point and everybody runs to that side. Anyone going the wrong way loses a life. When the Leader calls 'meteorite' then all the Cubs must get off the floor. Last Cub loses a life. Try adding the next four compass points (NE, SE, NW, SW) to the game. When the Leader calls 'thunderstorm' then all the Cubs have to lay on the ground.
- * **Kite contests:**
 Best flying, highest, most artistic, best use of materials, most innovative use of recycled materials, smallest kite (must fly!), largest kite (must fly!) and other ideas.
- * **The blowing wind:**
 Divide the Pack into teams of two Cubs. Have the Cubs stand face to face with their partner. Give each team a marble or a ping-pong ball. Draw a line on the floor using colourful electrical tape. The first Cub from each team sets the marble or ball at one end of the line and blows on it, attempting to move it to the other end of the line where their partner is waiting to blow it back to them.

the myth of aeolus


But as King Aeolus would not help them a second time, they had to make the best of it, and take the winds as they came. It was a long, long time after that, before they saw their homes again.

kites for everybody!

1. Collect a variety of recycled items, such as:
 - **Sails:** paper, plastic, trash bags, wrappers, foam trays, paper cups
 - **String:** heavy duty button thread, yarn
 - **Spars:** bamboo, food skewers, old blinds, wood sticks, straws
 - **Tails:** streamers, ribbon, strips of plastic
 - Do not use: heavy materials like metal, stretchy materials like plastic wrap or cotton fabric
2. Design your kite:
 - Design and build a unique and interesting kite
 - Eddy kites, sled kites and all kinds of flat kites are recommended
 - The kite should be symmetrical. Fold the sail in half to make sure
 - Use lightweight recycled materials and your imagination!
3. Construct your kite:
 - Your goal is to make the kite fly
 - It should also be creative and unique
4. Flying Recycled Kites:
 - Outdoor flying - weather permitting
 - Indoor kite flying - Use the Scout Hall and have the Cubs run around the hall (always in one direction!)
